What's Adderall?

Adderall is a prescription medication that combines two stimulants – dextroamphetamine and amphetamine. When used as prescribed, it can help people with attention-deficit disorders to focus and function more healthily. Unfortunately, it's often abused.



What's Meth?


Effects of Adderall

When Adderall is abused, its effects are similar to those of meth, and frequently include:

- Euphoria
- Increased alertness
- Increased energy

Not unlike meth, misuse of Adderall may bring on:

- Restlessness
- Suppressed appetite
- Weight loss
- Irritability
- Insomnia
- Depression
- Paranoia
- Hostility
- Addiction




Effects of Meth

Meth users experience some pleasurable effects, including:

- Euphoria
- Sense of invincibility
- Increased energy
- Increased alertness

But they also experience many negative side effects, such as:

- Confusion
- Deficits in motor skills
- Hallucinations
- Extreme paranoia
- Memory loss
- Dental problems
- Weight loss
- Insomnia
- Depression
- Aggressive or violent behaviour
- Addiction
